
Sadly, ordinary French citizens were starving while the rich lived in luxury. I mean, look at this place!




















ACT ON IT!



METAL WORKER

Ghanaian-born artist El Anatsui is famous for his 'bottle-top installations' large sheet-like sculptures made from thousands of small pieces of reclaimed metal sewn together with wire.



PENGUIN

Based in Berlin, Yuken Teruya works with waste paper and discarded toilet roll tubes to craft intricate sculptures that celebrate trees: the original sources of paper and card.



UK up-cycler Robert Bradford turns broken toys into playful pieces of art. Some sculptures contain over 3,000 components, and he can even portray people's pets!





I am the great William McGonagall, Scottish poet and tragedian. Though people who read my verses often considered me a comedian. Some said my poems did not scan well nor have a proper rhythm, but I took time to make them rhyme, so I would have an argument with 'em.

I was born in Scotland, or possibly in Ireland, in 1825. (There is some confusion over the country, but — hooray! — I was alive.) My father was a weaver in the beautiful Scotlish city of Dundee and that was the job I did myself after he taught his trade to me.

But in the historic
year of 1877, I left my
weaving loom behind, after
an urge to become a poet
suddenly entered my mind. So,
henceforth, I penned dramatic
verses about all sorts of tragic
tales including collapsing
railway bridges and the
deaths of monster whales.

















EARLY BY TARTERS BONN




