

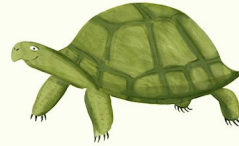



where in the world did the sleepy sloth go?



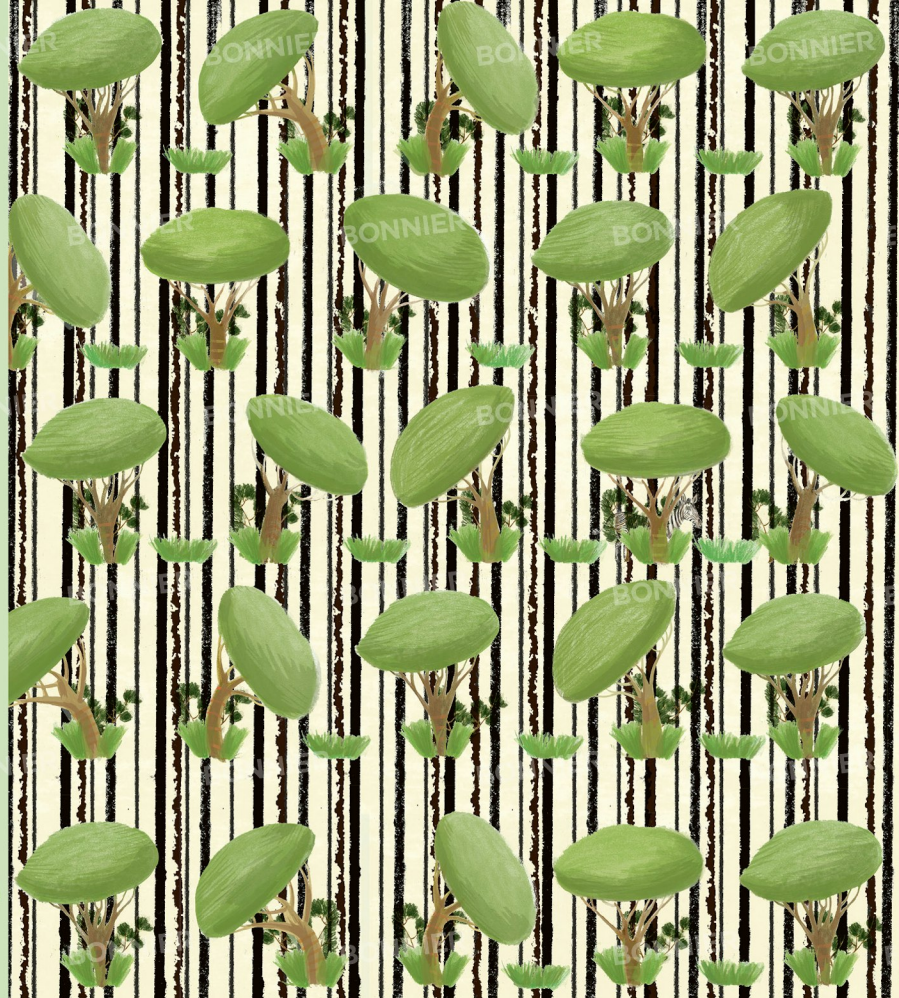


A creature is under the shady gum tree,

Where did the ghostly grey wolf go?





 Where did the snappy-nosed gharial go?

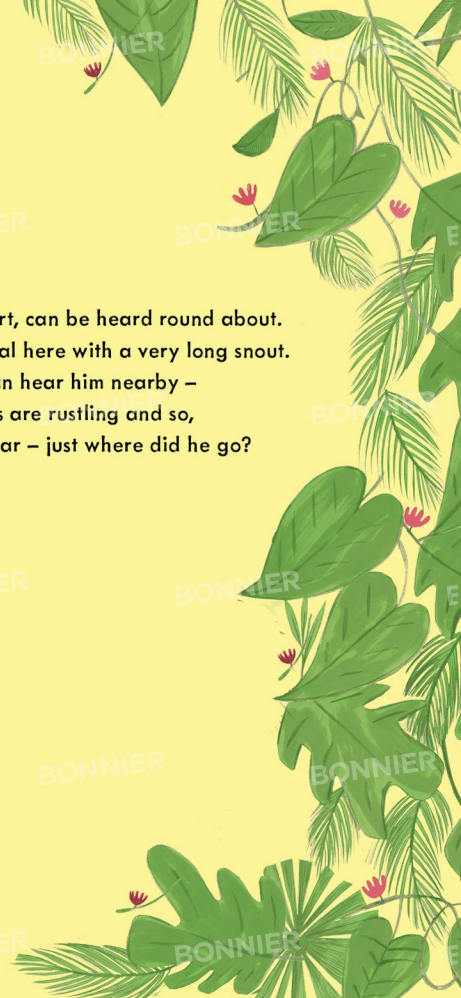




This big hungry bear loves

ADDAX

Addax used to be found right across the Sahara Desert, but they are hunted for their horns and there are fewer than 300 left.



RED SQUIRREL

Red squirrels are still common on mainland Europe, but the larger, stronger grey squirrels have almost completely replaced them in Britain.

BISON

Bison can weigh over a ton. Millions of them once roamed the grasslands of North America, but huge numbers were killed by 19th-century hunters.



MOUNTAIN GORILLA

Mountain gorillas are found high up in the thick forests of central and western Africa. These forests are being destroyed and there are only around 700 mountain gorillas left.



SLOTH

Sloths sleep up to 20 hours a day, and sometimes algae grows on their fur. The South American rainforests where they live are being chopped down.



BILBY

Bilbies are unique to Australia. Newborns stay in their mother's pouch until they are 11 weeks old. They are threatened by introduced predators like foxes and cats.



GIANT TORTOISE

Giant tortoises live on the Galápagos Islands, and weigh up to 250 kg. They nearly became extinct when people brought egg-eating animals into their habitat.



ZEBRA

Grevy's Zebras live across the savannas of eastern Africa. Each zebra has a unique pattern. More and more cattle are being grazed on the grasslands, leaving less food for zebra herds.

POLAR BEAR

Polar bears have adapted to live in the icy arctic. Under their white fur they have black skin to soak in sunlight. They are threatened by warming oceans melting the ice on which they live.



GREY WOLF

Grey wolves can hear a wolf howl 6.4 km away. Mexican Grey wolves are the smallest of all grey wolves and were hunted to near extinction in the US.



GHARIAL

Gharials live in the rivers of the Indian subcontinent. They have over 100 razor-sharp teeth, and a long, thin snout. Fewer than 200 gharials may be left in the wild.



GIANT PANDA

There are fewer than 2,000 giant pandas left. A panda can eat up to 38 kg of bamboo every day, but their bamboo forests are being cut down.



TAPIR

Malaysian tapirs have lived in the Southeast Asian forests for millions of years, but are under threat from habitat loss. Tapirs have a nose a little like an elephant's trunk.
