of my life, depended on what the examiner was about to say. I couldn't bear the thought of going home to Poland as a failure and perhaps spending the rest of my life as a governess dreaming of the life I almost had... and then lost. I was jolted out of my daydream by the examiner's voice. When everyone had quietened down he said, 'I will read the results in the order of merit. The student with the highest score is... Marie Sklodowska!' I couldn't believe he'd just said my name. After fearing that I might have failed, I'd graduated with the highest score. I was the first woman ever to graduate top of the physics class. All my worries fell away and now I was trembling with excitement and relief instead of fear. I couldn't wait to get back to Poland and give my family the good news.

I knew what I should do next, but I didn't know how to do it. I'd learned how important mathematics is to science, so I wanted to go back

to the Sorbonne and take a master's degree in maths. The problem was, I had no money left and my family couldn't support me any longer. They'd done more than enough to help me already. All seemed lost. I thought I'd probably look for work as a science teacher in Warsaw. Then a miracle happened. A scholarship fund that supported Polish students in other countries was told about me, and they decided to give me the money I needed. So, a few months later I was back in Paris, studying maths this time.

I graduated in maths in July 1894, but I felt a failure because I only managed to come second in my class. Soon after this I was asked to do some research into the magnetic properties of steel. It was important research for the new technology of electric motors and generators. I needed a laboratory to work in, but I couldn't find a good place. Then I was taken to meet someone who

might be able to help me. I walked into a friend's apartment and saw a tall man standing by the French window. He had large eyes and brown hair. The Sorbonne is one of the oldest parts of the University of Paris King Louis IX's chaplain, Robert de Sorbon, created it in 1257 using a royal donation of money. It was the bestknown part of the university and so the whole university became known as the Sorbonne.






a woman. It was a new experience for him. We got on with each other very well. When I went home to Poland in the Summer, he thought I had gone for good. He wrote to me again and again asking me to return to Paris. I remember one letter that said, 'It would be a fine thing to pass our lives near each other.' Eventually I gave in and went back to France. A year later we were married. Maria Sklodowska had become Marie Curie.

Just a few months later, we read about the discovery of X-rays by Wilhelm Roentgen. It caused quite a stir among scientists, because noone knew that these rays existed or what they were. And then we heard that Henri Becquerel had discovered more rays coming from uranium. Roentgen had to use laboratory equipment and high-voltage electricity to produce his X-rays. But the uranium gave out rays without the need for any equipment or electricity to produce them.



### X-RNYS

Wilhelm Roentgen (1845-1923) was a German scientist who was fascinated by devices called vacuum tubes They were glass tubes that the air had been sucked out of. An electric current flowed through the tube between metal contacts called electrodes. In 1895, Roentgen found that these tubes could produce invisible rays that made a screen glow. He didn't know what they were so he called them X-rays. He discovered that they could pass through parts of the human body and make a shadow picture on photographic paper showing the bones inside the body.
