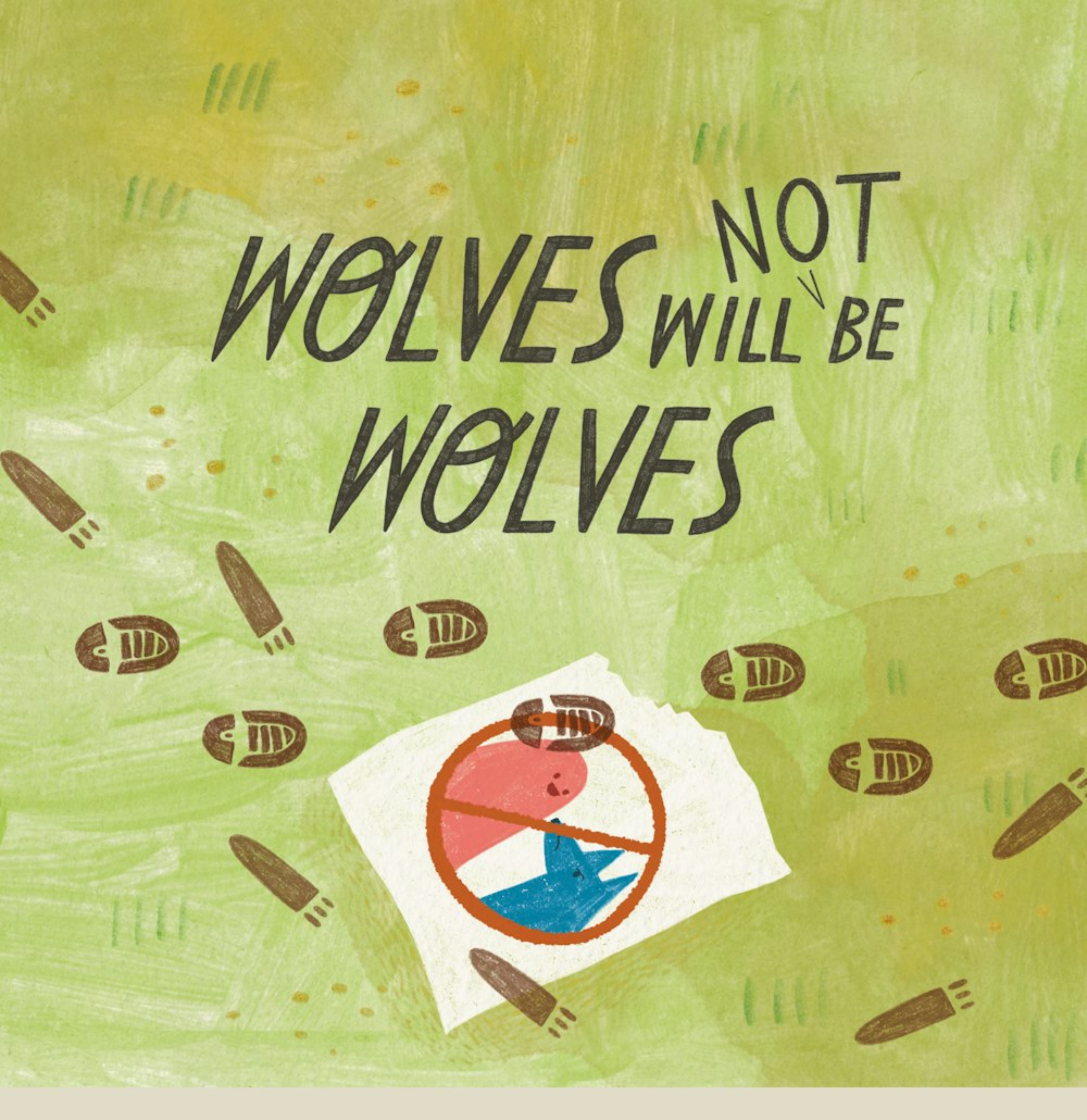

Sharing this book with children

A note from Laura Coryton

This book can inspire young readers to speak up when something is unfair, in order to create a more equal society. In doing so, it may also spark difficult and important questions.

For example, Little Red's passion to change the oppressive rules which maintained the tyranny of the Big Bad Wolf may cause children to question the merits of the rules which govern them, too.

To discuss the difference young readers can make, it's important to separate rules from laws. Pieces of legislation – or laws – protected by parliament, require considerable thought and effort to challenge respectfully and successfully. Therefore, it might be helpful to encourage young changemakers to consider the validity of the rules which govern them before they go on to examine the fairness of the national legal system. Local change can be just as powerful as amending a national law, if not more so!

Children can do so by asking themselves the following:

1

Does this rule exist for a good reason?

2

Is there a better way for the rule to achieve its aim? Is there a way it can include more people or perspectives?

3

What alternatives can you think of to this rule? Is your solution respectful and thoughtful?

This process will help build confidence, independence and problem solving skills so they can become the Little Reds of tomorrow, ready to make the world a better place!

Children may also question the wider themes this book examines such as sexism, victim blaming and holding perpetrators of violence to account.

To help children make sense of these big societal issues without feeling overwhelmed, several empowering and positive points can be emphasised by parents and caregivers, including:

If you're ever unsure about something or if you feel something isn't right, always speak to a trusted adult – they are here to help you.

Humans aren't perfect. Since the beginning of time, leaders and lawmakers have made bad decisions and mistakes, which we can experience the impact of today. It's up to brave people like you to help right these wrongs!

Finally, for me, the most important message of this book is that no matter how big a problem may seem, everything is solvable. So long as you stay committed to making the world a better, more equal place, you can truly do anything you set your mind to.

Laura Coryton started the international campaign against Tampon Tax which gained over 300,000 signatures and the backing of many prominent figures including President Obama. She successfully lobbied the UK Government into donating £90m to female-focused charities and to ending the tax in 2021. She's also an author and managing director of social enterprise Sex Ed Matters.
