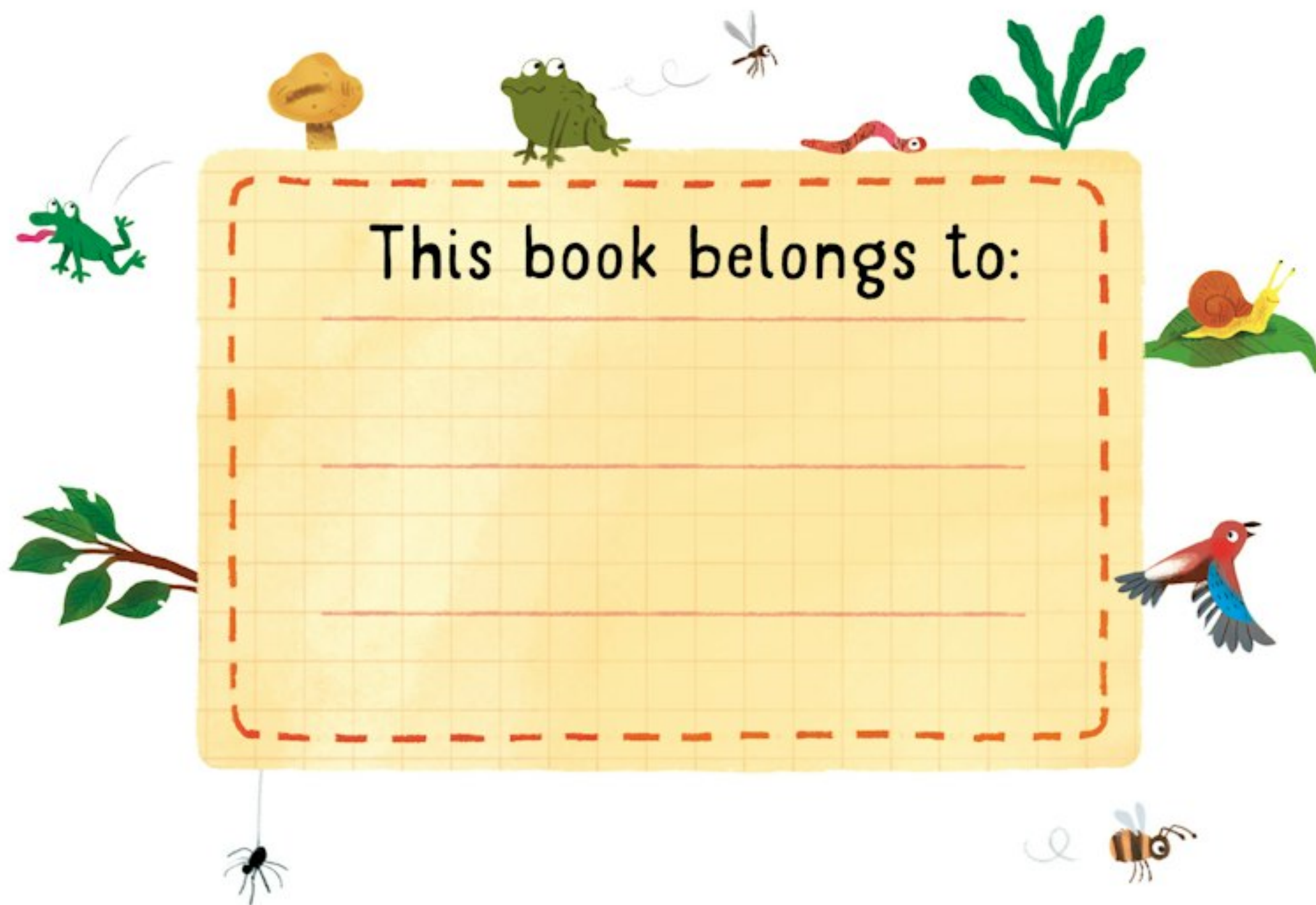

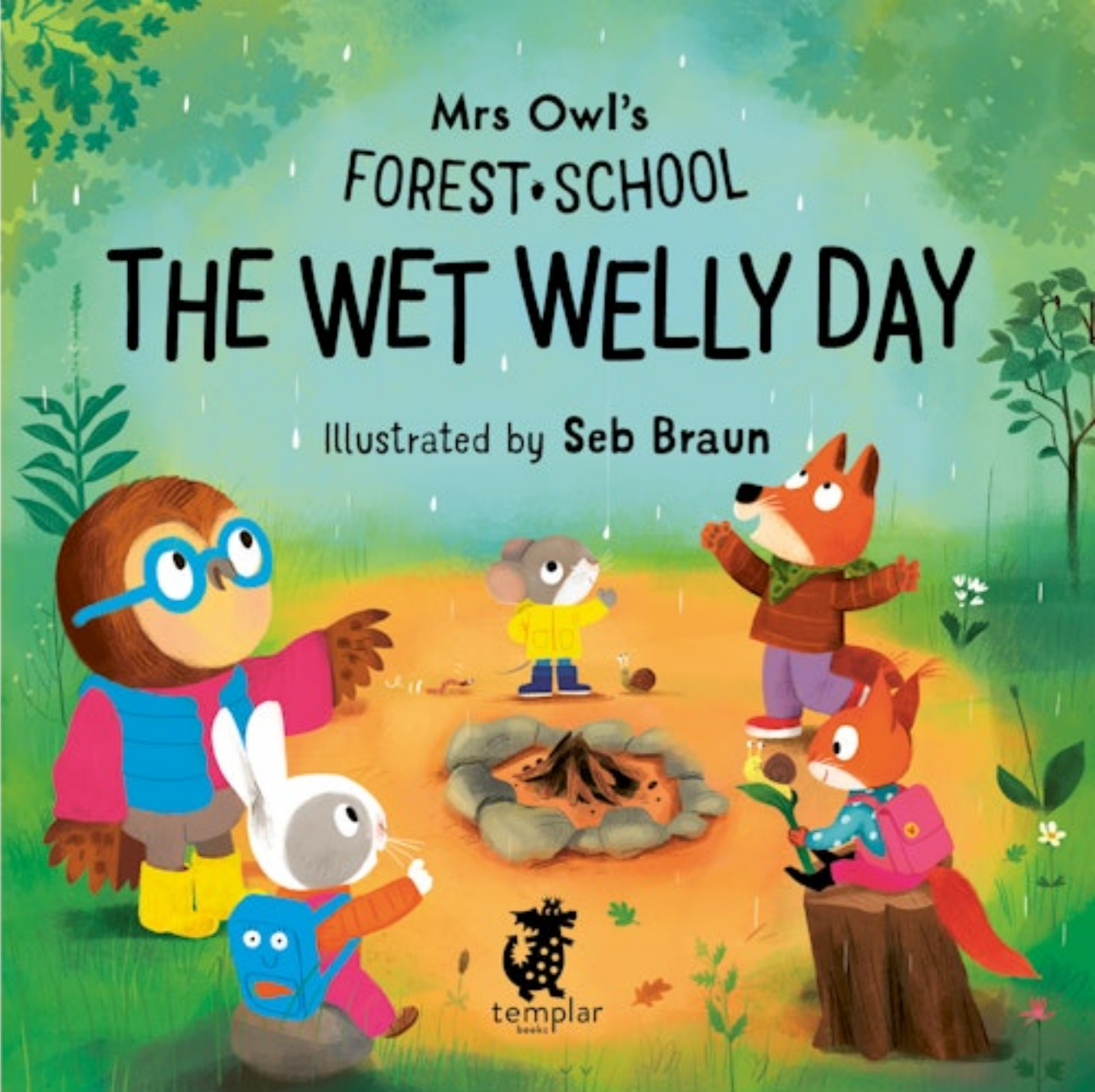

"Of course we can!" says Mrs Owl.  
"Quick, everyone into your waterproofs."

jackets and trousers. They all have wellies, too.



"See?" says Mrs Owl.

"There's no such thing as bad weather - just the wrong clothes!"



"But what are we going to DO?" says Mouse.  
"There's water EVERYWHERE!"



Lots of things change when it rains. What else is different when it's wet? Can you see the worms that have come up to enjoy the rain? Or the snails?

"That's right!" says Mrs Owl. "There IS water everywhere. But these puddles will only be here for a little while. How can we have fun with them?"

### MRS OWL'S GUIDE TO MAKING A BOAT

You will need:



2 Big Sticks for the base



10 Smaller Sticks



String (at least 1 metre)



Scissors



Cloth



1. Snap your small sticks so they are all about the same length.



2. Tie the first stick to the base, making a criss-cross shape with the string.



3. Repeat this for all other sticks. Do the same thing on the other side of the boat.



4. If you want a sail, tie or glue your cloth onto another stick and push it firmly between the sticks of the raft.

The friends send their boats sailing down the stream.



"Mine's winning," says Fox, splashing after it.

"Don't splash me," says Mouse. "I don't like it!"



"Sorry!" calls Fox, over his shoulder, but he is already racing ahead.



"Don't worry," says Rabbit. "Fox is just excited."

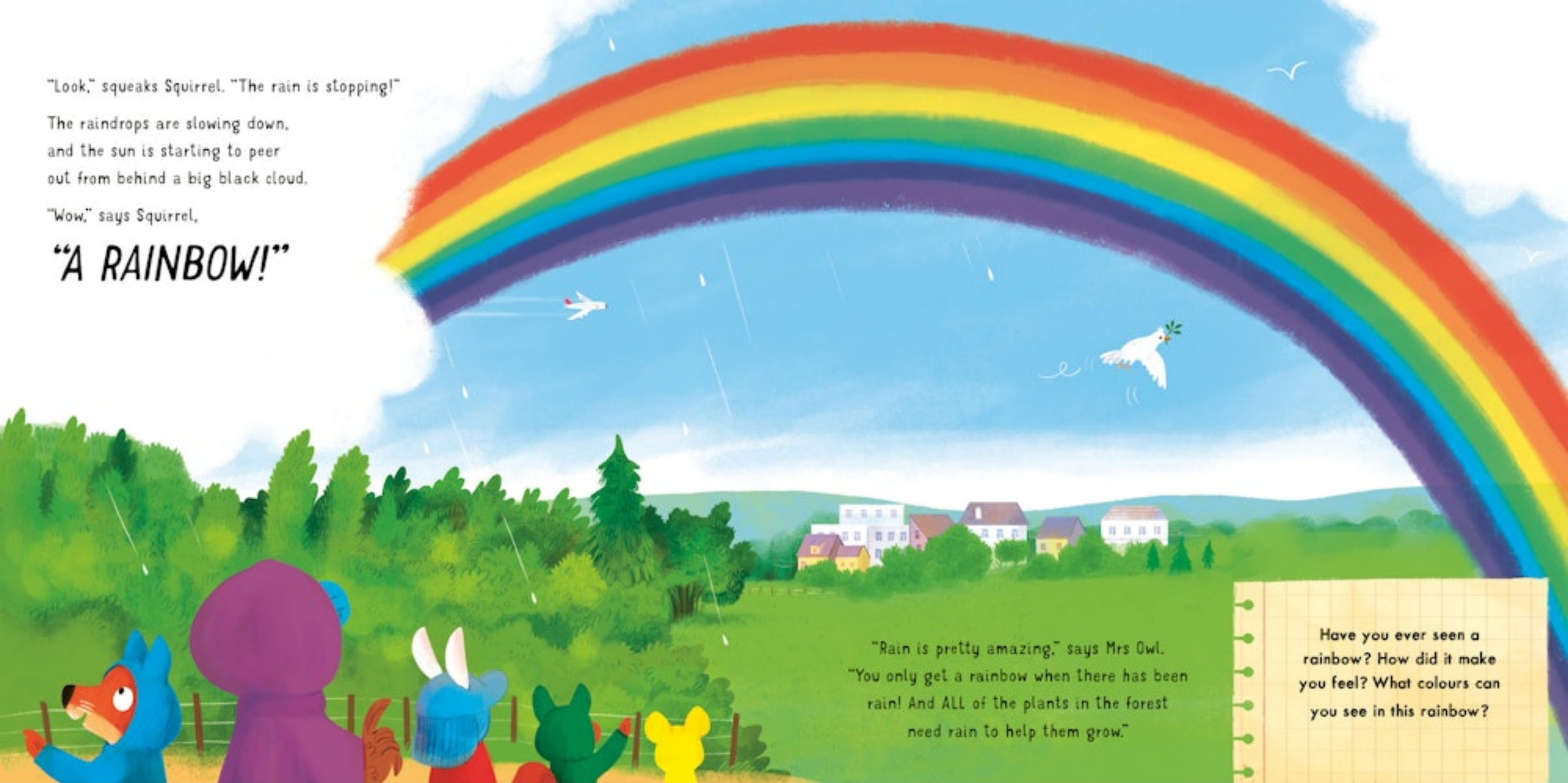


"Look," squeaks Squirrel. "The rain is stopping!"

says Mouse.

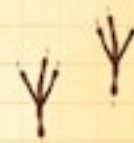
"You can see where we've

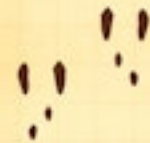

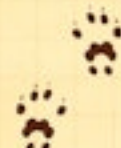

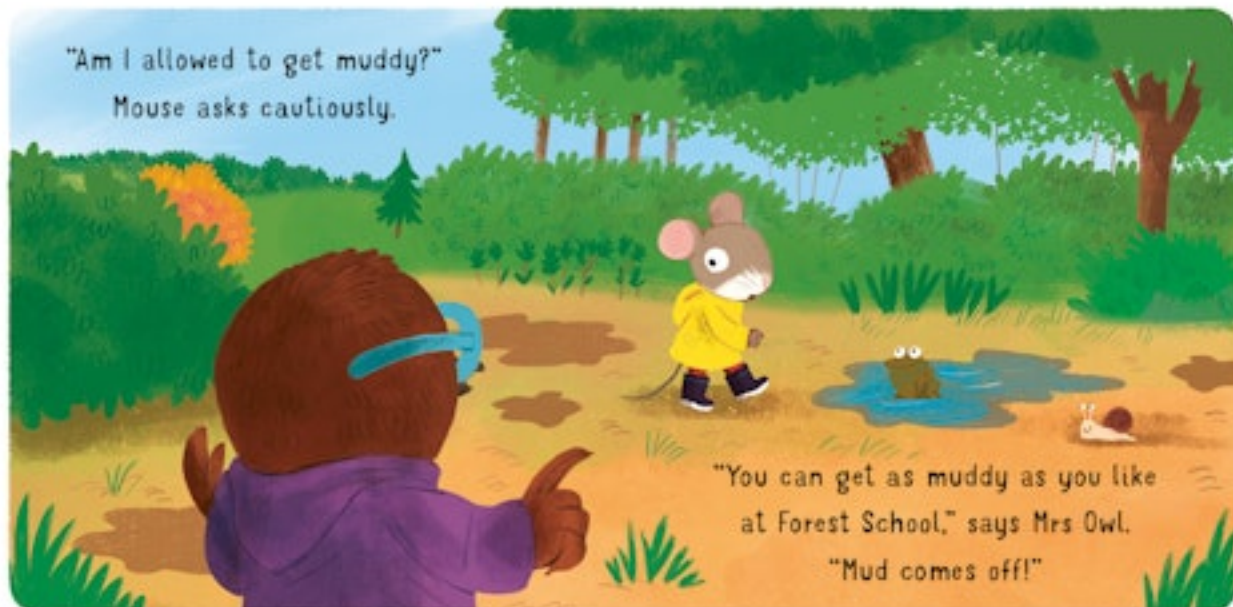

# MRS OWL'S GUIDE TO MAKING A MUD HEDGEHOG

You will need:



Dirt



Water



Sticks or Pine cones



Small Stones



A Bucket



A Wooden Spoon



1. In a bucket, mix together dirt and water to make a muddy mixture. If you don't have a bucket, you can mix it all into a ball on the ground!



2. When the mud is nice and thick, use your hands to shape it into a ball for the hedgehog's body.



3. Push your sticks into the ball to make the hedgehog's spikes.



4. Use small stones to make the hedgehog's eyes and nose.

5. Give your hedgehog a name – then wash your hands.

I think I'll call you...  
**Seb!**



"Wahey!" says Fox.

"This mud is so much fun!"

and up and down and...

...right into  
Rabbit's mud pie.



"My mud pie!" cries Rabbit.  
Her pie has been squashed.

Rabbit tries her best to smile.  
"It's ok," she says,  
but she still looks a bit sad.

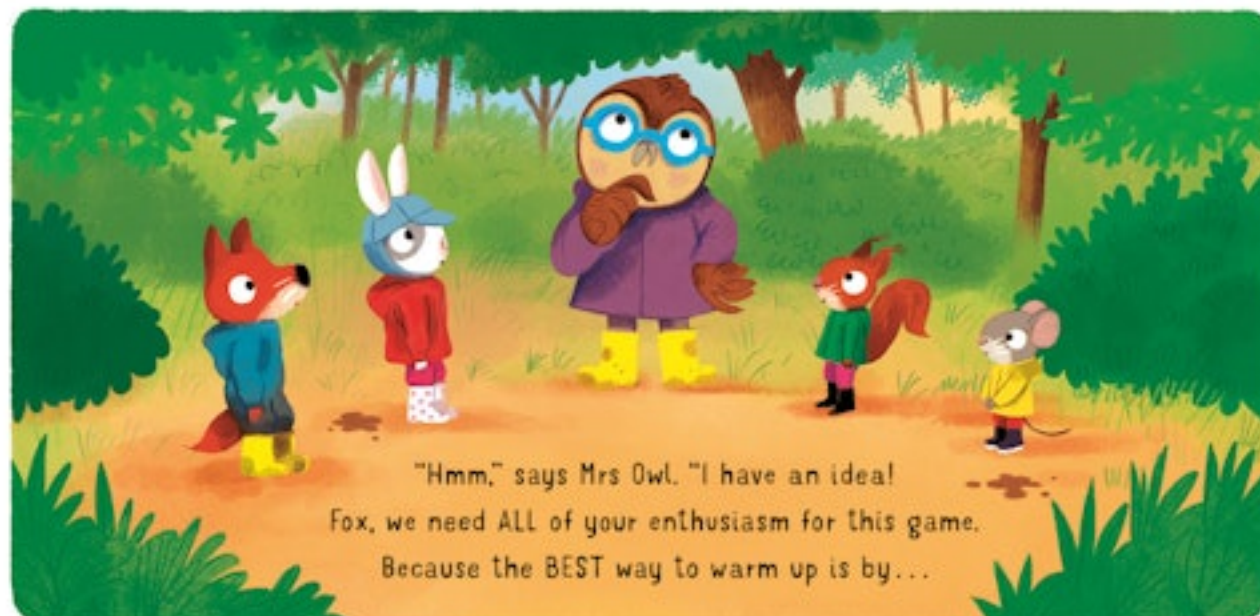
"That was kind of you to say sorry,"

## RAIN ON THE WAY

Meteorologists are scientists who study the weather. They can predict what the weather will be like days or even weeks into the future.

But there are also some everyday signs that rain is on the way. See if you can spot some!



Look at the clouds! White, wispy clouds usually mean fair weather.



There are signs in nature that a storm is coming. Birds will circle in the air, and pine cones will close up.

Have you ever heard the saying "Red in the morning, shepherd's warning; red at night, shepherd's delight"? Scientists say this old saying is usually true!

Red sky in the morning warns of storms, but if spotted at night, the next day's weather be a delight!



## WEATHER DIARY

You could keep a 'weather diary' to document how the weather changes day by day. Write or draw a picture to show what the weather was like every day. Do you notice any patterns?

Does the weather ever put you in a good mood, or a bad mood? Some people like rainy days, and some people prefer sun. Which do you like best?



Sometimes it's just too windy or the rain is too heavy for it to be safe to play outside. Why not build Mrs Owl's boats out of everyday things in your house and sail it in the sink?



Never play outside in a thunderstorm. If you are outside when a storm starts, stay away from large trees and do not use an umbrella.
